

Commodore's Corner

Fleets

The Spring Series is over, and it's time to see who is in the lead for the Outstanding Fleet Award. For those who've forgotten, never heard or couldn't understand the formula, this award is given to the fleet that excels in participation (based on the number of qualifiers,) growth in participation (based on the % increase in qualifiers) and on an objective measure of attempts at communication (based on the number of class sponsored regattas, but found that number very hard to track. This year, and for all years forward, that last measure will be dropped, and the 10% will be divided between number of qualifiers and increase in qualifiers. So, for those not already confused, here's the formula and current status for qualifiers only:

Number of qualifiers = 55%

Jets – 4 Force 5 – 4 Sunday Sunfish – 1 Laser – 1 Albacore – 1 Flying Scots - 1

Growth in qualifiers = 35% (# shown is percentage of last year's total)

Force 5 – 80% Laser – 50% Albacore – 50% Flying Scots – 50% Jets – 20% Sunfish – 8%

#Months off articles = 10%

It's anyone's trophy.

Race Committee Roles

One of the keys to an enjoyable Sunday afternoon for everyone racing at HSC is that the race committee performs their work correctly and crisply. Racers rely on the Race Committee (RC) to run the starting sequence accurately with visual and sound signals precisely on time.

The best way for the race committee chair to ensure that the starting sequence goes well is to make sure that everyone on the committee boat has a clearly defined role. Depending on how many people are supporting the RC Chair, sometimes an individual might have more than one role. For example, it is common at HSC for the RC chair to also be the timer and sounder.

Roles that need to be assigned for the starting sequence are:

Race Committee Chair: assigns role and makes all the major race management decisions.

Timer: calls the time sequence aloud so that the start can be properly run.

Sounder: in charge of making the sound signals that draw racers' attention to the visual signals.

Flag person: raises and lowers the start sequence shapes as required. Raises other flags immediately if a boat or several boats have started early.

Line Watcher: Concentrates on the imaginary line between the start line standard (white flag) and the front of the start line mark without distraction. At the start of each race, sights down the starting line to identify boats on the course side of the line at the start. Tracks boats returning to start.

Yeller: Yells the sail numbers of boats that have crossed of the line and started early.

Recording Secretary: Logs the racers names and boat numbers as they arrive on course and hail the RC. Records the order racers finish and finish times for the open classes.

Below is a typical sequence prior to the warning signal. The key is team coordination. The Timer begins the countdown for the starting sequence at the direction of the RC chair. At the precise instant that the timer calls "NOW", the Sounder sounds the horn and the Flag person raises the shape to the top of the mast.

The process of calling out the countdown is repeated for every signal in the sequence including the PREP and START shapes for

each fleet. The RC team needs to stay focused on the task. Hold all conversation until after all the fleets have started successfully. It is very easy to become distracted and miss or delay a signal.

Additionally, the Line Watcher job gets most intense at the exact moment a race starts. This person needs to limit their focus to the starting line and be certain of the exact position of the line. Different people have different techniques for maintaining their concentration. Some people close one eye to sight down the line. Others hold the top of the white start line flag, behind the standard to restrict the view downwind of the start line.

Laser Fleet

Excellent Start for HSC Laser Fleet

Congratulations to everyone who sailed a Laser in the 2005 Spring Series. It was an impressive start to our first full season as an official HSC fleet. 10 different skippers sailed in the series, a record that was only surpassed by one other fleet. We were also one of only two fleets that had boats out every week. And this was only a start - I know of several other Laser sailors planning to join us over the next few weeks.



Lasers for Youth

When I travel to Laser regattas one of the things I always notice is the large number of young people under 18 racing Lasers. For example, last weekend at Island Heights for the district championships there was a large turnout of boys and girls sailing in Radial and Full Rigs. With HSC's use of Sunfish as a training boat we tend to lose sight of the fact that the vast majority of yacht clubs across the country use Laser Radials as their single-handed youth training class.

The other day I saw some statistics about college sailing, a survey of what single-handed boats are used in colleges across the country. (See table below from collegesailing.org.) The message is pretty clear - if you are a single-handed sailor hoping to impress a college sailing coach and to sail on your college team, then you had better get some solid Laser sailing experience during your high school years.

Buying a Laser

We would welcome new sailors to the fleet especially from members taking the learn to sail classes. I bought my first Laser as soon as I learned to sail; actually it's probably truer to say that I *really* learned to sail properly *after* I bought the Laser. So I can speak from experience - it's an ideal boat for beginners.

So if you too are looking to experience the gold standard in single-handed racing sailboats, you will need to buy a Laser. Here are some good places to look for second-hand Lasers on the internet..

Laser Books

If you are just starting out in Lasers or looking to move up the fleet then you will have lots of questions about how to make the boat go fast. As the class is so popular, there are many excellent resources, books, CDs available. Here are two I would recommend.

The Complete Introduction to Laser Racing - edited by Ben Tan. Written by a team of experts this covers everything about Laser racing from boat setup, sail tuning and straight line speed to fitness, psychology and nutrition.

The Laser Campaign Manual - by Ben Ainslie. Worth it for the many excellent pictures of Olympic gold medallist Ben Ainslie showing exactly how to sail the boat on all points of sail and all wind strengths. On top of that there is a CD in which Ben demonstrates key skills.

Sunfish Fleet

The HSC Sunfish fleet hosted a racing clinic for Sunfish sailors at Spruce Run on June 18/19th. A group of local expert Sunfish experts passed on their expertise to the students on topics as diverse as steering properly, how to rig your boat like Eduardo and what to do about the voices in your head!

By special request, we are continuing with another episode of Nicky Einthoven's account of racing in the 2004 Sunfish Worlds. In the last episode, published in the March Focsle, she has just scored 81st place in the last race of day one.

After sailing I reread the Sailing Instructions, more carefully now that I have time. The offset mark is there. What exactly is the starting sequence? 10-4-1-go. And the 4 minute flag is either the standard flag, the I, Z, or black flag. It gets lowered at the 1 minute gun, which is a rule I have been hoping they change, I'd like to see that flag up sooner and during the last minute. What does the V flag look like anyway? It is an inverted M flag. They outlawed McLubing the hull! Set stopwatch to be more useful at a 10 minute start. I manage to set it to one minute intervals, so between races I can hit the button ten times to get a 10 minute countdown. This will work.

Tuesday

The wind is much lighter than Monday. I have the vang and outhauls looser than yesterday, and the gooseneck forward.

We sail out to the race course and start race 1. The course is Windward Leeward, with legs .9 miles long. My start was better than yesterday, but still left room for improvement. It took some work, but I could find a lane with clear air. On the first windward leg I followed the wind shifts, looked for clear air, and went to the right side of the course. On the other windward legs I went left to get less current, and only tacked for the largest windshifts. I pass people throughout the entire race, especially on the second windward leg and both downwind legs. On the last windward leg I duck behind a starboard tacker, who greets me by name in Dutch! I wonder who that sailor is? I memorize the sail number so I can look it up on shore. (It is Steven Smeulders, a past World Champion who I first met at the Sunfish North American Championships in Rehoboth Bay, Delaware, in 1988, when everyone there thought that I was his sister!) OK, half way up the last windward leg I ducked right behind him, I passed a small handful of boats in the remainder of that leg, he passed enough boats to finish 20 points ahead of me! I finished 43rd. I know I can do better. (In past Worlds, I finished in the 70's while people I regularly beat finished in the 30's. I am trying to get past that!)

I was eagerly waiting for the next race so I could improve on this score. The RC wisely decided to wait for more wind. Several times I drifted in the current quite far from the RC boat and sailed back. The current was taking us home. Some sailors decided to vote for abandonment by sailing in. The judges boats went over and pointed out the distance and direction to the RC boat. The RC had binoculars and weather radio and decided to wait. When I am near boats where the skippers are speaking in Dutch, I speak in Dutch too. We were not leaving the RC until they flew an abandonment flag. There were six boats staying close to the RC. We were having delusions of top ten finishes! (If the wind did fill in, they would tow the other boats back, or there would be time for them to sail back while the RC set the buoys.) After a very long wait, the race was abandoned, and they towed us in. The boat towed in front of mine was Hans van Aanholt, the brother of past World Champion Cor, from Curacao. We had been talking in Dutch and he asked where I was from. He knew all the Curacao people and I was not one of them, and there were only 2 sailors from the Netherlands and I was not one of them, so how come we were speaking in Dutch successfully? Tuesday's dinner was included in the entrance fee. I sat with the table of Dutch and Curacao sailors. I got to meet Paul van Alphen's wife Marcella, who has taken up sailing after their wedding. She apparently was eager to meet me because she heard from so many people about the time I sailed in the Open Netherlands Sunfish Championships. She says that I am rather famous in that group of people.

Wednesday

The notice board said the RC would attempt to do 3 races. There was a group photo scheduled for 10am, and the first race at noon. The current would slow down as the day went on. I look up Steven, Posy, and Abi. I met Posy's cute cute daughter! The wind was stronger than yesterday, but still rela-

tively light. We left shore before 11am. The RC did not start at 12 noon, they waited for more wind. Race 1, I had a bad start, no clear air, slow boat speed. I finished a dismal 80th place. Abi asked me what I was doing back here since these were my kind of winds and I belong up front. There was a long delay waiting for more wind, but the wind was always stronger than yesterday. A sea breeze of sorts filled in with wind stronger than this morning, but still well below white caps. The RC set a course while the judges boats rounded up the straying sailors. *To be continued*.
