The 2005 HSC Regatta Permit has been approved by the Spruce Run Recreation Area, and, after 7 weeks, by the NJ Marine Police. A copy of both is on the HSC bulletin board, outlining our responsibilities, including the need for the RC boat anchor light.

Permission was granted for beach storage of Sunfish during the training period. Permission was granted for overnight parking lot boat/trailer storage for June 4, June 18, July 9 and August 27, PROVIDED that those event organizers supply a list of trailer numbers to the Park office that afternoon.

We await feed-back on our proposal to join the state Water Watch Program. We expect to meet with the officers of the High Bridge Rescue Squad in the near future. They are the "first responders" for Spruce Run.

Race Committee

Race committee duty is a fun and challenging way to participate in the club. I enjoy setting up and watching the different races.

The individual class races are rather straight forward. Each boat's place is the order of finish across the finish line, but the Open Fleet is a bit different. The Open Fleet uses a handicap system which allows different boat types to compete evenly against each other. This year it looks like there is going to be a good turn out of the open fleet so here are some points to remember for race committee members when handling the open fleet races:

- 1. Remember to note the time that each boat in the open fleet took to sail the course. Its best to do this for all boats sailing in the open fleet even boats from a recognized class at HSC that did not get their own separate start. Those boats will be scored in there own respective fleets but record their times anyway. This will make for more interesting results for the open fleet for that day.
- 2. Estimate the average wind speed for each race of the open fleet and note it on the score sheet. Tough to do I know at Spruce Run but try your best.
- 3. Give extra attention to instructions to the open fleet sailors. There is a good chance guests and club members not used to racing will be in the open fleet. Make it as easy and unconfusing for them as possible so they will have a good experience and want to come out again. If it is a boat you are not used to seeing out, ask the crew if they are comfortable with how we do our starting. Be proactive in helping them understand.
- 4. Be sure to write down the skipper's name and sail number. Not just one or the other.
- 5. Please list all members of race committee serving for the day.

On board the committee boat there will be blank score sheet forms. You can use as many as needed and then forward them to:

Downwind Landing in a Breeze – Building Skills

Landing on a lee shore with a stiff wind blowing, safely and without getting excessively wet, is among the more difficult maneuvers in sailing. The problem is how to keep the wind from pushing on the sail(s) when you want to stop and exit the boat in shallow water.

The usual method of turning the boat to windward and hopping out, DIAGRAM A, can be surprisingly difficult to execute in shallow water as your daggerboard, centerboard or rudder may hit bottom and mess up the turn (too much or too little). On board boats (Sunfish, Force-5, Laser) if you pull your daggerboard well up, the boom may hit it, catching the wind and causing a capsize if your boat turns away from the wind. On the other hand, removing the board completely causes loss of ability to steer effectively, and you may crash before you get turned.

Here are some less risky alternatives:

On board boats (no shrouds), untie the stop knot in the end of the mainsheet, Head downwind and release your mainsheet so the sail completely reverses itself to the front of the boat. Pull out your daggerboard, and drift safely downwind to shore without fear of capsize. DIAGRAM B

On sloops (with shrouds), turn upwind while still in deep water, drop your main while using the jib to keep forward motion to maintain steerage. Position the boom well to the side so you have room to steer with the tiller, and hold it there with the mainsheet. Turn downwind toward the shore using the jib, and raise your centerboard. Release the jib completely to slow down. To go to really shallow water, you can pull out your rudder and steer with a paddle. DIAGRAM C

Answer to Rules Quiz

In the May Fo'c's'le we asked what you are supposed to do if you are racing and see a boat flying a flag of a white diagonal cross on a blue background with someone on board blowing a whistle repeatedly. The answer is "round it" as it is replacing a missing mark.

The flag described is code flag M. Racing Rule 34 states that "If a mark is missing or out of position, the race committee shall if possible,

- (a) replace it in its correct position or substitute a new one of similar appearance, or
- (b) substitute an object displaying flag M and make repetitive sound signals."
