Minutes of the General Membership Meeting

The first general membership meeting took place at the Sunset Inn in Clinton on Sunday, February 26. Two important items were presented to the membership for their approval. Such members will receive full voting privileges, but will not have access to training courses, use of club equipment, or participation in most racing events, unless they join as full HSC members." Caleb Zimmerman Captain of the Junior Fleet

Hunterdon Sailing Club (HSC): Caleb, who is eligible to be a member of the Hunterdon Sailing Club's Junior Fleet?

Caleb Zimmerman (Caleb): The Junior Fleet is made up of kids under 18. We sail different kinds of boats, either alone or as crew on other boats

HSC: What is the goal of the Junior Fleet?

Caleb: We hope to improve participation and get more kids out on the water. In recent years only a small group of sailors have participated on a regular basis, so we are focusing on getting newer sailors involved.

HSC: When does the Junior Fleet meet?

Caleb: We race with the rest on the club on Sundays and on Wednesday nights. From 3 p.m. -5 p.m. on Wednesdays, we have a Junior Fleet practice run with HSC member Doug Brown.

HSC: Do you have any major events planned for the 2006 season?

Caleb: We will continue our Junior Fleet racing program like last year, and hopefully have more kids travel to SANJL (Sailing Association of Northern New Jersey Lakes) events or other regional regattas.

HSC: Caleb, how long you have been sailing?

Caleb: I've been sailing for five years, and I've been a member of the Hunterdon Sailing Club for five years.

HSC: Would you share with us your accomplishments as a sailor?

Caleb: I placed second in the Jet-14 Junior Nationals with crew Teddy Wells. I placed 7th in the Sunfish Junior North American Championships as well as 46th out of 83 in the Senior North Americans. I also finished second in the SANJL Junior Championship.

HSC: That's terrific. Do you hold a membership in any other sailing clubs/organizations?

Caleb: Yes, US Sailing, the United States Sunfish Class Association, and the Jet-14 Class Association.

HSC: Caleb, is there any other sailing related information about yourself that you'd like to share with us?

Caleb: I plan on sailing competitively in college, and I am visiting schools to decide where I want to apply.

HSC: Good luck with your college search, Caleb. And finally, what is the best way for prospective junior sailors to contact you?

Caleb: By email at sunsailor@comcast.net, and at Hunterdon Sailing Club events.

HSC: Thank you, Caleb, for filling us in about the Junior Fleet. Interested youth are encouraged to contact Caleb today!

Nicky Einthoven Captain of the Ladies Fleet

Hunterdon Sailing Club (HSC): Nicky, who is eligible to be a member of the Ladies Fleet?

Nicky Einthoven (Nicky): Any lady, woman, girl, gal, Miss, Ms, Mrs, daughter, mom, mother, grandmother, ... all female members, female spouses of members, as well as members' daughters who have not reached their 22nd birthday during or prior to the current calendar year. (After a request for equal rights, Ladies events have been expanded to include men.)

HSC: What is the goal of the Ladies Fleet?

Nicky: The goal of the Ladies Fleet at the HSC is to promote and educate the women of the HSC on the sport of sailing. Sailing is a thrilling sport, which can dramatically increase a person's confidence in all aspects of her or his life. Sailing not only involves physical abilities but also requires knowledge and mental skills, which makes it a sport where men and woman can truly be competitive on the same playing field

HSC: When does your fleet meet?

Nicky: We meet at any and all HSC events.

HSC: Do you have any major events planned for the Ladies Fleet for the 2006 Season?

Nicky: Yes, The HSC Ladies Fleet sponsors a Fun Day, which is open to all members of the club as well as a Ladies Regatta.

HSC: Do you have a personal sailing or fleet motto?

Nicky: Join the Fun!!!

HSC: How long you have been sailing?

Nicky: Occasionally since 1972, and regularly since I was

11 years old.

HSC: How many years you have been a member of the

HSC?

Nicky: 31 years. My dad officially joined the HSC in the spring of 1975 after crewing for others at the HSC for a few years, so I have enjoyed the benefits of membership since 1975, even though I did not have to join in my own right until 1986 and had occasionally crewed for others at the HSC starting in 1972.

HSC: Would you share with us your accomplishments as a sailor?

Nicky: I won a national championship with 37 boats including all the champions from the previous 10 years, and also all the champions of the following ten years, tying the youngest person to ever win the Jet nationals, and being the first woman to win the nationals. Yes, I beat Brent Barbehenn and Jamie Brickell that year!

I qualified to represent the US in the Sunfish World Championships a few times. In the 2005 Sunfish North American Championships I finished 21st of 83 boats. I am a US SAILING registered class B Athlete. The largest fleet I ever won a race in was 51 boats in the Jet Nationals in Saratoga NY in 1983. The second largest that I remember is 39 Sunfish at Greenpond in the late '90s, a race I won with almost a whole leg lead over the second place boat. The largest lead I ever had in a race (was as crew) is over 10 minutes in a one hour-long race in the Junior Jet Regatta at the HSC.

I have been a US Sailing Level 1 Instructor for six years. I have boxes of sailing trophies in the attic. I raced in the Sunfish World Championships in the Bahamas, in the Dominican Republic, on Long Island, and on Cape Cod. I won the Bluenose Challenge three times.

When I was about 85 pounds, I sailed a full rig Laser in a regatta at Long Beach Island on a very windy day, and the wind kept increasing: I capsized 36 times on the second leg (a reach) of the second race, after only capsizing twice all day before that. That Did-Not-Finish did not dissuade me from continuing on with sailing in other events!

HSC: I see that persistence is definitely one of your personal traits! Do you belong to any other sailing clubs or organizations other than the HSC?

Nicky: Yes, Boat US, Jet-14 Class, Sunfish Class, Force 5 Class, Laser Class since 2002, US Sailing, the Trailering Club, formerly a member of Windmill Class, and Europe Dinghy Class.

HSC: Nicky, what other sailing-related information about yourself would you like to share so that we can get to know you better?

Nicky: I love sailing.

I have sailed on: Jet-14, Sunfish, Force 5, Day Sailer, Albacore, Laser, Flying Scot, Hobie 18, Windsurfer, Sailboard with a dot in its sail, Celebrity, Mobjack, Prindel, Phantom, Snark, Mayflower, Lightning, Dickerson 37 Ketch, 110' Clipper, Downeaster 35, Benetau 43, Mark Spack's boat 35', Dad's friend's boat in Enkhuisen in the Netherlands 35', Optimist Pram, Thistle, Solar Sailor, 420, Minifish, Super Sunfish, Europe Dinghy, DN iceboat, ice-windsurfer, Penguin, Cape Cod Frosty, Laser Radial, Laser II, the Osterschelder (in the exit parade of Tall Ships in Amsterdam), and of course, my bicycle (when I was a kid, during windy, non-rainy storms, we would use a towel as a spinnaker...).

Over the years, I have sailed (a sailboat) in every month except March.

HSC: Finally, what is the best way for prospective sailors to contact you about the Ladies Fleet?

Nicky: At the Spruce Run Reservoir during HSC events, or interested people can call me at (609) 882-3392.

IN THEORY

Get the right 'helm'

The feel of your helm is one of the most valuable clues you have about the performance of your boat. In fact, many speed-related trim adjustments to your sails and hull should key off the amount of pull or push that you sense in your wheel or tiller.

It's usually good to have a little pull in your helm when sailing upwind. If you let go of the wheel or tiller, you want the boat to start turning gently toward the wind. This "windward helm" is good for at least two reasons. First, it means the rudder is contributing to the lift forces created by your underwater surfaces. Second, it gives the helm a positive feel that makes it easier to keep the boat in the groove.

Most helmspersons agree it is hard to steer when the boat has a mushy, or neutral, helm. And it's annoying to steer when you have to keep pushing the tiller away from you (leeward helm). Ideally, you want about three or four degrees of windward helm. This is the number that consistently seems to give the best performance.

In light air, however, it can be difficult to get enough helm. And in heavy air, you often end up with too much. If you are fighting the helm, or if you have to push the tiller to leeward to head up, then your boat is unbalanced and not going as fast as possible. In these cases, you need to adjust the trim of your sails or hull in order to move closer to the optimal feel in your helm. In the chart below, I've listed some simple adjustments you can make if you want more or less helm. •

Windward helm is the tendency of a boat to head up toward the wind when you let go of the wheel or tiller.



This dinghy will go fastest upwind if it is sailed nearly flat. When you have a lot of heel, the boat will want to head up quickly toward the wind (i.e. it will have a lot of windward helm). To counter this, you have to pull the tiller quite far to windward to keep the boat going straight. While a small amount of rudder angle is usually good, the amount shown in this photo creates excess drag and is definitely slow.

	More helm	Less helm
Crew position	Move crew forward and to leeward	Move crew aft and to windward
Mast rake	Rake the mast farther aft	Rake the mast farther forward
Mainsheet trim	Trim so the leech is tighter	Ease so the leech has more twist
Angle of heel	Heel more to leeward	Flatten the boat
Sail shape	Make sails fuller, especially the main	Make sails flatter, especially the main
Centerboard	Move it down	Move it up and/or aft

Here are some ways to increase or decrease windward helm. When sailing upwind, you usually need to create more helm in lighter air and less helm in heavy air. Your goal is a gentle pull on the wheel or tiller.

Rule 42 Seminar

Be sure to attend the General Meeting on March 26, where the discussion will center on:

42 PROPULSION

42.1 Basic Rule

Except when permitted in rule 42.3 or 45, a boat shall compete by using only the wind and water to increase, maintain or decrease her speed. Her crew may adjust the trim of sails and hull, and perform other acts of seamanship, but shall not otherwise move their bodies to propel the boat.




