A New Shed for HSC!

On Tuesday, March 27th, the new storage shed was delivered. It has a 50% increase in floor area, great storage and easier accessibility through the 9 foot wide garage doors. The project began late last year with research by Charlie Engler who found the competitively priced Country Wood Crafters in New Hope. In December, the Club's Executive Committee met with Park Superintendent Becky Williams-Ellis who supported the plan. She shepherded our written proposal through several layers of State Park Administration in Trenton. As a result of her efforts, we received approval and placed our order for the shed, allowing 3-4 weeks for manufacture.

On Saturday, March 10th, a work crew consisting of Bob Orr, Mike Incantalupo, Skip Leslie, Chet Ensign, Bob Slaughter, Dave Stockwell, Kathy Mancuso, Nick Mentesana, Joanne Shaver, Charlie Smith and Gordon Sell removed everything from the old sheds. The final work of the day was a super-human effort with hydraulic jacks to remove the ramps that had been so carefully made by Mark Califano and Bob Griswold only two years before. Most gear was stored on-site under a large tarp while valuable items were moved off site.

The following week, a CWC work crew arrived to remove the old sheds and prepare a stone pad for the new building. The site was scraped flat, laser leveled and then covered with 12 tons of gravel. They used their Bobcat-style mini-dozer to fill in some of the swampy area that used to be in front of the old Rutgers Shed.

CWC did an outstanding job of placing the shed on the site and completing the finishing touches. Thanks to all who've been a part of the effort! Everyone's help has been much appreciated.

This year to meet safety and insurance requirements, children, teens and adults participating in on-the-water HSC "learn to sail" programs are required to take a "swim check". At the Hunterdon County YMCA, Deer Park facility in Flemington, we will confirm that participants can adequately swim with clothing on, tread water, put on a life vest in the water, etc. The swim check costs \$10/person payable to the YMCA. Participants should plan for their swim checks on May 12th, May 19th or June 2nd from 1-3 PM.

Safety First -- Always!

Low body temperature due to prolonged exposure to cold is a real concern warns the NJDOT. Thanks to

Nicky Einthoven for bringing this article to our attention as we start the 2007 season.

With a possible body temp of below 95 degrees, hypothermia is characterized by uncontrolled shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness and apparent exhaustion.

Hypothermia requires immediate medical attention, but in the meantime, how can you help?

- Remove all wet clothing.
- Warm the body core using blankets or your own body heat.
- Do NOT warm the arms and legs first! This drives the cold blood toward the heart and can lead to heart failure.
- Do NOT administer drugs or alcohol.

Plan proper sailing attire in the cooler months. A wet suit or foul weather gear can help. Select noncotton fabrics that do not trap moisture next to the skin and use a USCG certified life jacket. And most important, be aware of your fellow sailors!

Sandbag the Sailor

After carefully observing his new patient and making terse notes - "disheveled...sun burnt ...wide-eyed...agitated...prob paranoid & hallucinatory" - the psychiatrist sat back and waited for the twitching wretch to speak:

* * * *

Sandbag the Sailor took over my Sunfish!! No, no, not the way to begin this. I'll try to be calm. I belong to the Hunterdon Sailing Club and this 1969 season on Spruce Run Lake has been long and hot and tense. We sail 3 races in little boats and spend the rest of the time on shore, arguing with other skippers. The arguments are over "protests" that we've filed against each other over who fouled whom, and who violated what rule of the International Yacht Racing Union. And these boats are barely 14 feet long with a single sail! We also have fierce disputes over which way a board goes into a slot and whether it's called a centerboard or a dagger board.

The Protest Committee tries to wind up all the hearings and settle the scattered fist-fights before it gets dark. I should explain here that the object of a sailboat race is to cross the finish line first, so you can get back to shore and file the first protest which usually has more weight than the counter-protest filed by the boat you beat. During the race you announce your intention to complain about a boat by hanging a red flag on your own boat. Sailing races are very colorful with all those white sails and red flags against a blue sky.

But...but...but something really weird hap...hap... happened yesterday! I had just launched my Sunfish, backing too far in the water and getting the trailer lights wet again, when I noticed odd activity on the beach. Some of the skippers were filling bags with sand, using little beach shovels. I first thought nothing of it, because we yachtspersons often revert to childhood pastimes to ease pre-race tensions.

But then the Race Chairman called me over, and explained that a "minimum weight" of 175 pounds would now be required for each boat. The new rule, he said, was to keep lightweight skippers from walking away with a race, since weight is critical in little boats, especially when sailing in light air. So somebody weighing 175 or over would be okay. If less, the difference would be made up in sand weight.

I was mortified! During the past year, on a night-marish diet, I'd managed to get my weight down from 175 to 155. And now I had to make it all up in sand. I asked the Chairman if I had time to eat a quick 20 pounds of fast fat foods. He said no. Grimly, I shoveled up 20 pounds of sand, weighed in, tied the bag at the top, and carried my gritty crew to my boat.

We all sailed out for the first race, and as we assembled at the starting area I could see lots of other sandbags sitting stiffly in their boats. The gun boomed, and we were off. I forgot about sandbags for the moment, as once again I heard that familiar pulse-quickening "flap-flap-flap" sound of open rule-book pages in a stiff breeze.

Just after I'd rounded the first buoy, my sandbag yelled "Starboard!" to another boat.

I looked over in amazement. The sandbag had assumed a more relaxed position against the splash-guard. From somewhere, he had gotten a pair of sunglasses, with a string tied around the back to keep them from falling in the water. Then I heard the sandbag in the approaching Sunfish yell "Hold your course!" But to avoid a collision I had to steer around the other boat even though I had right of way.

My sandbag chuckled, and hung out a protest flag.

I must have gone into shock at that point, because all I can remember are isolated bizarre events. In the second race, the sandbags started shouting rules and nasty remarks at each other. By the third race they'd taken command of all the boats and were steering them into furious luffing matches. And the protests – there were *hundreds* of them! My sandbag, slouched at the tiller and clenching an upside-down pipe, directed me to hang out flag after flag. One sad event that sticks in my mind was winning the final race, but being disqualified. A stern Race Committee ruled that all those protest flags had doubled my sail area, making the class boat illegal. A dreaded DSQ was penned on my record sheet.

As I crept away from the beach in shame, I took a last look back. And what I saw is why I'm here on a psychiatrist's couch. There was my sandbag, standing smugly on a scale, dropping skippers into a sack.
