LBJ Regatta

Wednesday July 4, 2007 ... what a great day! Sailors from the Sunfish, Jet14, Albacore, Daysailor and Flying Scot fleets were all represented. The wind was a gift as it came in at 8 AM from the South and didn't shift more than 10-20 degrees all day.

At 11, the skippers assembled to learn about the course and their fleet's handicap. The starting line was just south of the parking area and the 1^{st} race began with 2 double-handed Sunfish leaving the line at 12:21 PM. All the fleets were off the line in 11



minutes with 4 Flying Scots in hot pursuit.

The course led everyone straight upwind to the dam and then off on a broad reach to the Tower building. Spinnakers were flying as the wind held steady from the South on the longest, straight leg of the course. The next leg took the fleet upwind to just east of the power lines. Once around the mark, they headed back down to the Tower and headed east on a tight reach back to the dam. The leaders worked the wind to their advantage, edging up slightly in the puffs and managed to make the next mark without a single tack. The wind was blowing 8-10 and the race leaders finished the first part of the course in 40 minutes.

The remainder of the race was twice around a long windward-leeward course. Derek Jackson wasn't giv-

Junior Sunfish Champs

On the weekend of July 21^a the Bertocci/Altomare kids sailed in the 2007 Sunfish Junior North American Championships in Southold, Long Island. It was the first time any of us had sailed on salt water and the experience was a bit terrifying. During the practice races, the wind was between 15-20 knots with higher gusts. Even with a Jens rig and the cunningham and outhaul pulled as hard as possible, we couldn't keep the boats flat. After Simon flipped 6 times circling in the starting area, he decided to call it a day. Lucy and Nathan called it quits after the 1^a race since we wanted to have our boats intact for the actual regatta. We were in a bit over our heads; nevertheless, just going out and sailing in that kind of wind was a great learning experience.

On Saturday the wind had calmed down considerably. It was blowing 10-15 and we all had to work to keep flat. It took all of us a few races to start to understand the starting line. With 37 boats there was much jostling and shouting and not much room to maneuver. The race committee boat had a mark floating off the transom to keep the boats from getting too close which made it very easy to get stuck barging. You had to start below and come up underneath to start legally. Chop was also a new concept that had to be factored in. Pinching is not an option when a large wave can wash over the bow of your boat and park you. The first day of the regatta finished with everyone feeling good about their scores. Lucy was 9th, Nathan was 10th and Simon was the 1st Midget and 21st overall. There had been only one large mistake - Nathan managed to hook another sailor's life vest with his boom and capsized at the start. This led to a rather poor finish but was made up for by his 1^{st} race of the day where he placed 3^{rd} .

Sunday began with wind around 13 knots and diminished throughout the day until it was about 5 knots. As the wind died it became clear that the chop was going to pose a larger problem. Light air however is not something new to us. The more the wind died the better we did. Nathan and Lucy had been scoring in the 9-14 range but in the last three races managed a 7-4-5 and a 6-5-6. We also managed to score within one point of each other in most of



Unlike smooth water on a lake, Simon learned that you can't point high in a chop. In the last race, he sailed low and fast. Even though he started last, he worked his way through the fleet and ended up 18^{th} , his second best finish. At the end of the day, Nathan placed 7^{th} and Lucy was 9^{th} . Simon was 22^{rd} overall, easily winning the midget North American championship by 39 points over the 2^{rd} place midget.

New Members Sail

Six new-to-HSC sailors along with Chet Ensign and Gordon Sell were out on the water on Sat, July 21st under blue skies and companionable winds. Most had recently completed the 'Learn to Sail' program and one had just returned from grinding a Genoa on 'True North' at St. Marten's "12-Meter Challenge". We considered him experienced - and lucky!

Class started with discussions about the important role of the crew. In addition to the simple mechanics of working the sails and tending to other controls, we stressed the importance of keeping a watchful eye all around the boat and communicating with the skipper. "The best rule-of-thumb is to assume your skipper does not see something," Chet advised. "I would rather say 'Got it - thank you' 50 times than miss hearing about the one item I didn't see."

Then we were off to sail in the "companionable" winds which had escalated to challenging. Fortunately with four crew, a Flying Scot is a very stable platform and even the few 20 MPH gusts that arrived with white caps did not rattle the boats or crews.

We dropped 2 temporary marks and spent the next few hours tacking, jibing and rounding marks. We rotated students through crew positions and the training became a multi-purpose exercise in sail trimming
