HUDSON RIVER SLOOP CLEARWATER ADVENTURE

(Kim Gold's Excellent Adventure)

For one week this past October I had the unique opportunity to sail and live aboard a historic replica of an 18th/19th century sloop called the Clearwater.

The sloop Clearwater sails along the Hudson River, New York Harbor and Long Island Sound. For the week I was onboard we were docked at 79th Street in Manhattan. We sailed all day and explored Manhattan at night. It was incredible.

As always though, it was the people who made the experience so memorable. It was a very inviting, friendly and hilariously funny group of people. One of which is a long-time member of the Hunterdon Sailing Club – Brian Mohan! It was wonderful to share this experience with Brian and I am grateful for his cheers of encouragement as I was climbing aloft.

Experiencing life aboard a ship was amazing. As a volunteer crew member I was fully included in all daily activities of the crew. The "typical" day consisted of a 6:45 a.m. wake-up. Instead of an alarm, the first mate sang a song, recited poetry or told a short story. At 7:00 a.m. the crew was on deck to swab the deck which consisted of pouring buckets of salt water on the deck and then scrubbing the deck with brushes. After that, all the painted surfaces were wiped down with fresh water. At 7:30 a.m. we ate breakfast and announcements of daily assignments were made. Next chores were completed and the boat was prepared for sailing. From 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. the first educational sail was held. Then the crew ate lunch and prepared for the second educational sail which was held from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Other Meeting Objective: Sail chat

After the last sail the crew secured the boat for the night, ate dinner, completed chores and hung-out. Quiet time started at 10:00 p.m. and many were fast asleep soon thereafter. There is nothing as comforting as falling asleep to the rocking motion of the boat. I was surprised how quickly I adjusted to living onboard and was not even aware of the rocking anymore.

Sailing for six hours a day was incredible. Each day we held two, three hour educational sails on the Hudson River for groups of students that ranged in age from third grade to adult. The students spent the first half of the sailing experience as a whole group working together to haul up the 3000 pound main In order to raise the main sail half of the students were on the port side to raise the throat of I encourage everyone to experience sailing the sail and half were on the starboard side to raise the peak of the sail. One of the crew functioned as the sail talker for the peak side and another was the sail talker for the throat side. After instructions were given the respective sail talker yelled "Are you ready on the throat/peak, Haul Away". While raising the sail everyone said "Heave, Haul, Heave Haul, Heave, Haul". Once the sail was raised the sail talker told the students to "walk forward" and then a crew member tied a stopper knot. As soon as the stopper knot was secure the sail talker instructed the students to "drop the line". A crew member then cleated the line. After the sail was raised the students worked with the on-board educator to collect fish with the trawl net. They also learned about the environment.

During the second half of the trip the students were divided into smaller groups and assigned to a group leader with whom they rotated through five learning stations - Navigation, Chemistry, Atmosphere, History and Fish. At the Navigation station students used the tiller to steer the sloop. In Chemistry the water quality of the Hudson was tested. Atmosphere emphasized how air quality is affected. History the students went down below and learned about the role sloops played in the transportation of goods. At the Fish station students examined the fish they caught.

One of my favorite parts of the sail was the "moment of silence". During this time everyone on-board was asked to be quiet and to take in the beauty of the sloop, listen to the sound of the sails and observe the wind. Then you heard the sound of a bell and a crew member sang a song or played a musical instrument. Incorporating music into the sail is an important part of Clearwater.

Clearwater's founder, environmental activist and folk singer/musician Pete Seeger, emphasized teaching through song. importance of song is not only seen teaching on-board the sloop, but also in the various. annual waterfront music festivals held each year by Clearwater and the various Friends of Clearwater Sloop Clubs. The largest is the Great Hudson River Revival which is a two day music festival that attracts up to 20,000 people each year.

Treasurer's Commentary on Proposed 2008 HSC Budget

The following is a short summary of the proposed 2008 Hunterdon Sailing Club budget for approval at the next Annual meeting.

Membership: 100 members, annual dues \$95 (same as 2007) with a \$15 late fee. For 2008, the budget assumes HSC will retain most of its current members and will draw new members through training and other programs and publicity.

Training: 78 youth and Adults enrolled HSC training, race team and practice programs in 2007. We have conservatively budgeted for 60 in this year's budget (learn-to-sail classes at capacity). The youth training fee is the same as 2007 but the adult training fee is increased to \$75. Our training programs are very popular and have grown to where a contractor lead instructor is needed (many volunteering club members will still be needed for the training programs!). We have included a budgeted amount of \$1500 in expenses for this contractor, and the next step will be to define the scope of the role, format of the contract, and the process for candidate selection.

Operating Expenses: Budgeted operating expenses for most line items are in keeping with actual expenses in 2007 or with typical levels. The contract instructor mentioned above is the one major change.

Capital Expenses: The capital budget includes \$750 for items to improve the race committee boat and shed. We are rebuilding our capital reserves as we enjoy the spectacular new shed we purchased last year!

Other Information: Current balances of the Training Reserve and main checking account are also shown as of 12/31/2007.

The proposed 2008 budget was reviewed at the January 13th officer's meeting and will be reviewed for approval at the Annual Meeting on February 24th. The Executive Committee will be available to answer questions. - Ellen

Milfoil News

Here is an article written by a Milfoil expert, T. Remaley, referenced in the February 2004 NJDEP overview "Nonindigenous Plant Species in New Jersey" that Bob was kind enough to send.

It is most interesting to read that the easiest, best and cheapest means of control and prevention mentioned by Mr. Remaley may well turn out to be what I've been suggesting....lowering water levels 8 or 10 feet for a month or so during freezing weather, particularly if the previous winter also had full levels.

Such lowering has happened this year at Spruce Run, due to dry weather conditions in the fall, following several years of nearly-full winter water levels, a condition we normally endorse for both recreation AND water supply considerations!

During this year's draw-down, it was impressive to see that the Milfoil plants completely dried up and any residue completely blew away. Come next spring and summer we'll be able to easily see if a draw-down is Nature's control method.

A history of Spruce Run water levels, supplied by Ed Buss at NJWSA, shows that winter water levels rarely have been less than almost full for more than one consecutive winter, leading one to believe that this could explain the virtual absence of milfoil at Spruce Run for over FORTY years.

Interestingly, we did hear of one recollection of Milfoil in 1975, a year which also followed three years of nearly full reservoir levels.
